Please choose one of the three school templates for your home page. All three templates have similar features and have different layouts.

Website Features

- ¥ Image Carousel (similar to SCUSD.edu) that rotates between 2-5 images.
- ¥ 3 Static Story Blurbs under the Carousel section – these are often used for upcoming events and ongoing school initiatives or fundraisers.
- ¥ Quick Links section – have up to eight links for easy access. These can link to a page on the website or another website.
- ¥ Welcome message – a short message from your principal or introduction to the school
- ¥ Link to District Website and optional links to Facebook or Twitter page
- ¥ Staff roster page
- ¥ School calendar page
- ¥ Email newsletter capability
- ¥ Optional Report an Absence form (can be customized)

School Branding

Once you decide on a template, we will customize your website with your school's colors and use your logo, mascot or image of the school to customize the top banner for you. The registration form requires you to upload one of the three images types depending on your template choice.

The first step in the process of writing is to choose a topic. This is often the most difficult part of the process because there are so many things to write about. You should choose a topic that interests you and that you know something about.

Once you have chosen a topic, you should do some research. This will help you to gather information and to develop your ideas. You should also think about the audience you are writing for and what you want to say.

After you have done your research, you should start to write. You should begin with an introduction that tells the reader what you are going to write about. Then you should write the body of your paper, which is where you present your ideas and evidence. Finally, you should write a conclusion that summarizes your main points.
